Pronunciation Activity A

This activity works on the -ed ending sounds that students learned in Lesson 2 and uses vocabulary from that lesson. Feel free to follow the pattern given in the Lesson 2 Grammar Box to add or substitute the words given here.

Before class, print the game board from the N2N handouts. In each box, write either *d*, *t*, or *id*. These should be randomly placed, e.g., *d*, *t*, *t*, *id*, *id*, *t*, *d*, etc. In the final box, write all three ending sounds. Make a copy of this game board for each group of three or four. Print and cut up a set of game cards from the N2N handouts for each group. Gather a game marker for each student.

In class, place students in groups. Demonstrate the game. The first student will draw a card, determine the sound of the *-ed* ending on that card, and make a sentence using the word. Then, s/he will move his/her game marker to the closest space on the game board with that ending sound. After that, the next student will draw a card and repeat the process. The first student who reaches the end of the game board will win the game.

Pronunciation Activity B

Station 1: RSVPs and Gifts

When you receive a wedding invitation, look at the names on the envelope. Only the names of the people written there are invited. If it says, "and family," or has the names of your children, then your children are also invited.

You should RSVP as soon as you can so that the bride and groom can plan for the right number of wedding guests. You will either send a card back in the mail, send an email, or use a website. You might need to tell them which food you want to eat.

You should send a gift or take a gift to the wedding. Many couples make a gift registry when they are engaged. They make a list at a store with the things they want. The wedding invitation will say, "We are registered at" with the name of the store.

Station 2: At the Ceremony

You should arrive at the wedding ceremony about 15 minutes before the time that is on the wedding invitation. You should wear very nice clothes, but don't wear white. That is only for the bride.

At the beginning of the ceremony, the wedding party enters. The bride will come last. Sometimes, she walks with her father.

The wedding ceremony might include these things:

- special music
- people talking about the meaning of marriage
- wedding vows
- giving wedding rings
- lighting a special candle
- finishing with a kiss

Station 3: At the Reception

After the ceremony is the reception. Sometimes the reception is in a different place from the ceremony, so you might need to drive there. Some receptions have a full dinner. Other receptions just have snacks for the guests.

The reception might include these things:

- A special dance between the bride and groom
- A special dance between the bride and her dad
- Dance music for all the guests
- Food and drinks
- Games
- People talking about the bride and groom
- Time for the guests to give their best wishes to the bride and groom

Station 4: The Send-Off

The wedding usually is between two and six hours long. The bride and groom leave with a special send-off. This is a time for the guests to show their love for the couple as they start their new life. The couple chooses how they want the guests to say goodbye. The guests might blow bubbles, throw birdseed, or wave sparklers as the bride and groom go to their car.

After the bride and groom leave, it's time for the guests to leave. There might be small gifts, called favors, from the bride and groom for the guests to take home.







Station 1

Fast Food Restaurants

Many people go to fast food restaurants because they can get their food very quickly. They often go through the drive-through to get their food without getting out of the car. Some fast food restaurants have places inside for children to play.

Fast food restaurants usually have food ready even before you order it. Hot food stays under hot lamps and cold food stays in refrigerators, so that the food is ready all the time. Inside a fast food restaurant, you walk to a counter to order your food. You get all of the food at one time and you pay for the food when you order it. Then, you carry your food to a table or take it home. When you are done eating, you throw away the food containers and plastic utensils.

Station 2

Fast Casual Restaurants

Many people like fast casual restaurants because they often have fresher and healthier foods than fast food restaurants, but they are still fast. You can eat inside the restaurant at a table or take your food home. The food is more expensive than a fast food restaurant.

In a fast casual restaurant, you walk to the counter to order your food and then wait while the workers prepare the food for you. You pay for the food when you order it. Sometimes you are given a small box to take to your table. When your food is ready it makes a noise or lights up, and you walk to the counter to pick up your food. All of the food is ready at one time. When you are finished eating, you throw away the food containers and utensils or put the dishes and utensils in a box for washing. The area where you sit is comfortable and might have music playing.

What are some fast casual restaurants that you know?

Station 3

Sit-Down Restaurants

Many people like sit-down restaurants because they can go there with family and friends and enjoy a meal together. You almost always eat inside the restaurant or at tables outside, although you can usually order food to take home if you want. You might need to make a reservation for a table on a weekend evening or a holiday.

In a sit-down restaurant, a host or hostess takes you to a table or booth and gives you menus and utensils. The food comes at different times - first appetizers, then salads, then the main course, and then dessert. Sometimes, they have specials. The food comes on real dishes, not plastic or paper dishes. The workers in the restaurant make the food when you order it. When you are finished with your meal, you ask the server for the check and you usually pay it at the table. You also leave a tip for the server.

What are some sit-down restaurants that you know?

Station 4

Fine Dining Restaurants

Fine dining restaurants are more expensive than the other kinds of restaurants. The experience is different, with pleasant music, a calm feeling in the room, and professional servers. You should almost always make a reservation to eat at one of these restaurants. People usually don't take small children to these restaurants. You should wear nice clothes when you go to a fine dining restaurant. They have highquality food that is made when you order it. They usually have specials.

On the table, you might see a few glasses, dishes, and utensils for each person. For example, there are different forks to use for the salad, main course, and dessert. A server brings each course of food to the table at a different time. The table usually has napkins made of cloth. When you are ready to leave, the server brings your check to the table. You should leave a tip for the server.

Station 1: Kitchen Fire Safety

If there is a fire in your home, you should always call 911 first. If the fire is small, you can try pouring baking soda on it. You can also use a fire blanket.

A **fire blanket** works well on small fires and is easy to use. You just open the package, unfold the blanket, and put it on top of the fire, leaving it there for about 15 minutes. After you use a fire blanket, you should throw it away and buy a new one.

If someone's clothes are on fire, the person should get on the floor and roll around to stop the fire. You can also wrap a fire blanket around the person before she or he rolls on the floor.

A **grease fire** happens when oil or grease burns. This might happen if you have a pot with oil on the stove that gets too hot. You should <u>never</u> put water on a grease fire. Water will make that fire get bigger. First, call 911. Then, if you can, turn off the stove and cover the fire with a lid or a fire blanket.

Station 2: Home Fire Safety

It's a good idea to have a **fire extinguisher** in your home. You must know how to remove the pin and spray the extinguisher towards the fire. It will work for about 10 seconds. If there is still a fire after that, or if the fire is big, don't try to use the fire extinguisher. Go outside right away and wait for the fire department.

After you use a fire extinguisher, you should replace or refill it. Check the label to see how long the fire extinguisher will still work. You might need to replace it if it's old.

Most clothes dryers have **dryer vents.** This is where the dryer is attached with a hose to a small opening in the wall so that the hot, wet air from the clothes can go outside. Every three months, you should clean the lint from this hose and make sure the outside vent is clean to **prevent** a fire.

Every time you use the dryer, you should clean the **lint** from the lint filter. This is a small container that collects the lint.

You can also buy a dryer called a condenser dryer. This kind does not have a vent. The water from the clothes is saved in a box in the dryer, so you might need to pour out the water every time you use it. It's more expensive than a dryer with a vent, but it has a lower risk of a fire.

Station 3: Carbon Monoxide

Carbon monoxide is a gas that you cannot see, feel, taste, or smell. It can come from cars, gas stoves, chimneys, furnaces, and some types of **dryers**, space heaters, and water heaters. If you breathe it, you can become very tired, confused, nauseated, dizzy, or even die.

A **carbon monoxide detector** makes a loud noise if there is carbon monoxide in your home. If you hear the carbon monoxide detector making noise, you should go outside right away and call 911. It's a good idea to have a detector near every sleeping area and on every floor of your home. You should change the batteries every year.

To **prevent** having carbon monoxide in your home, you should regularly have a professional check anything in your home that burns gas, oil, or wood to make sure it's working correctly.

Station 4: Childproofing

When a baby starts being able to move around a home, it's important that the family is ready with **childproofing**.

Here are some ideas:

- Cover sharp corners of tables
- Put locks on cabinet doors
- Move items that can break inside cabinets or on high shelves
- Put all **poisons** and prescription drugs inside cabinets with strong locks. Put other items that could be dangerous inside, too, like bleach and detergents for the washing machine and the dishwasher.
- Unplug electrical items that you don't need to use
- Buy special outlet covers to keep children from putting fingers into outlets

If you aren't sure what else you need to do, try sitting or lying on the floor and looking around. If you can see and grab something that's dangerous, you should move it.





Station 1: Preparing for Your Flight

Before you go to the airport, make sure you have your **passport** or **ID** and that your luggage is prepared. Find out your airline's rules for the size, weight, and amount of luggage you can take with you. There are different rules for carry-on luggage (purses, backpacks, and small suitcases) and checked luggage (large boxes or suitcases).

Find out about the rules for liquids. In most places, you can take a small bag with small bottles of liquids (100 mL or 3 oz.) in your carry-on luggage, but larger amounts of liquids must go in a checked bag. This includes even bottles of water. You also must keep sharp items, like scissors or knives, in your checked bag.

Consider checking in for your flight online. This is usually available 24 hours before you leave and will save you a lot of time, but it's not required.

Station 2: Arriving at the Airport and Going Through Security

Arrive at the airport two to three hours early. Check in with the **ticket agent** in the **terminal**. You will need to show your passport or ID. If you don't have your **boarding pass** already, you will get it here. If you are checking luggage (sending it in the bottom of the plane), the ticket agent will weigh it, put a tag on it, and give you another tag for each piece of luggage.

You will need to go through the **security** area. Follow the directions from the security officers. You will usually need to take liquids and electronics out of your bags. You might also need to take off your jacket, belt, and shoes. Your bags will go through a machine to look inside them, and you will walk through a special scanner, too.

Station 3: At the Gate and Boarding Your Flight

Find your gate. This is where you will wait until it's time for your flight to leave. If you have questions, ask the **gate agent** (the worker at the gate). Listen carefully and read the screens at the gate. Sometimes, the gate agent might need to talk to you. The gate also might change.

You might find out that your flight is **overbooked**. You can choose to take money for a later flight or stay on your original flight. However, the airline might still "bump" you (remove you from the flight, whether you want to stay on it or not).

When it's time to board, take all of your things and get in line at the gate. Be ready to show your boarding pass and ID or passport to the gate agent. Then, you will go to the plane. You might have to ride a bus to the plane or you might go directly to the plane from the gate.

On the plane, the **flight attendant** can help you find your seat. You can usually put your carry-on luggage either above your seat or under the seat in front of you.

Station 4: When You Arrive

When the plane lands and it's safe to get off, take all of your luggage with you. If you have a **direct flight** and you have checked luggage, you will get it at **baggage claim** before you leave the airport. If your luggage is lost, talk to an agent in baggage claim about having the luggage brought to you later.

If you have a **connecting flight**, you will get your checked luggage at your final destination, so continue on to your next gate. If you are flying through a different country, you might need to go through security again. Then, find the gate for your next flight and wait to board the plane.

If you **missed your flight**, talk to a ticket agent for your airline to get a seat on another flight.
