Vision LA Shares Christ in the Cultural Bedrock of America

The Los Angeles (LA) area is a uniquely diverse community. Known for its glitz and glamour, rich men and beautiful women, the LA area is home to more than nine million people. It is where Hollywood's actors live, where almost every culture from around the world is represented, and where the Gospel message of grace is desperately needed.

Scott Bridges, pastor at Christ Presbyterian in Santa Barbara explains, "It's a different kind of world. It's exciting to live where pop culture is being generated, but what we find behind the excitement are people who are hungry to find a place to call home."

Seeking to provide that home is Vision LA, a church planting effort of Pacific Presbytery, with participation from Mission to North America (MNA). Pacific Presbytery stretches from Santa Barbara and Bakersfield down to Las Vegas and back to LA. With 14 PCA churches, eight of which are still in the church plant stage, and a Reformed University Fellowship (RUF) campus minister, Geoff Shaw, at the University of California at Santa Barbara, Scott and the other church planters are bringing the Gospel to people proud of their secular lives or variety of religions — and they are seeing people come to Christ.

As church planters, Scott and Bill Powis, pastor at Pacific Crossroads in Santa Monica, came to the area wanting to do what most church planters set out to do: to answer God's call-


ing by spreading the truth of the Gospel. But what they found was a unique community with a different set of challenges. "In the past, PCA church planters have had a difficult time surviving here," Scott says. "This is an area in love with itself. But now we are seeing God do tremendous things. God has gathered people in our churches who are growing into a strong base for ministry. Frankly, we're having a wonderful time just trying to keep up with Him!"

Scott indicates one of the differences in church planting in the LA area is that programs don't work.

"People are increasingly leery of programs. They don't want to participate in anything that could uncover and expose them. They want a safe place to listen or share opinions. They want to build relationships."

Pastor Bill Powis describes the LA area as "the breadth of cultural diversity." In 2000, Latinos had replaced whites as the largest ethnic group in both the city and Los Angeles County. More African Americans reside in California than in any other state, and the Asian American population has become the third largest ethnic group in the LA area.

Mark Kuiper, church planter and pastor for Christ Church Pasadena, says making a strong connection and forming relationships is essential in getting visitors to return. An important aspect of those relationships, Mark explains, is that the visitors realize it's a church of real people. "They see that everyone, from the pastor on down, is in need of a Savior. They find out the glory of God, His greatness, is that we can have a relationship with our Savior."

The emphasis on relationships also extends to the church planters. Because of the hard times church planters have experienced in the past, the pastors and church planters have formed a strong bond with each other that helps them through the struggles. They get together frequently to deepen friendships, to encourage one another, and to pray. When talking with a potential church planter, Scott asks, "Can you be family?" "We're tight," he says. "To come here you need to be committed to being family. These men grip me when I need it, and I've got a shoulder to cry on when I need it. Through mutual encouragement and support, we experience God's grace keeping us strong." Even though anxious to see many more church planters join them, those who are already in place realize the necessity of a real call of God to minister in this area.

This powerful camaraderie played a substantial role in Brannin Pitre's decision to head to the area as a church planter in early 2005. "When we visited with the men in California, we could easily see the bond between them as they co-labor for the Gospel in the greater Los Angeles basin. It is a team effort they are trying to convey, and it is working." Currently assisting on the developmental side of *Vision LA*, Brannin is creating awareness within the PCA of the LA area's needs, with individuals concerned about the LA area, and with individuals and ministries beyond the PCA. "The area is changing every day. Its openness to Christianity is changing. More people are now willing to listen to the truth of the Gospel. We need to be ready to care for their needs by extending the transforming love of our Savior spiritually, socially, and culturally."

Collaborating with other organizations and ministries outside the PCA is a key element to church planting in the LA area. This is a place where those who truly name the name of Christ must put aside ordinary divisions and work together for the advancement of the Gospel.

Members of Christ Presbyterian in Santa Barbara work on Habitat for Humanity projects and volunteer at the local rescue mission. Scott emphasizes that the commonality between the church and the other organizations is that they are "like-minded." Christ Presbyterian and Pacific Crossroads have taken great strides to form prayer alliances with other Christian churches in their respective areas. They pray for each other and their communities, especially the city leaders and prominent citizens who have substantial influence over the areas.

Another significant area for opportunity in the LA area is college ministry. Scott reports that there are more colleges and universities in the area than in the entire state of Texas, and the strength of the one RUF campus ministry at the University of California at Santa Barbara under the leadership of Geoff Shaw is evident.



Owen Lee, pastor and church planter at New Life Church in Burbank, explains his biggest challenge is trying to overcome the success driven attitude dominant in the affluent communities and encourage the people to lift their eyes toward heaven. "We seek to help them let go of this world and embrace Christ, to see their true inheritance."



"The school is academically rigorous," Scott relates. "There are a lot of parties, a lot of liberalism. They are not seeking out a reformed faith. But Geoff has an amazing ministry. He is faithful to go after both covenant kids and those who need Christ. Only a few of the growing number of college students involved have PCA backgrounds, but they come because they've found people who love them."

At Pacific Crossroads in Santa Monica, the congregation teams up with other organizations in the community to help the urban poor and needy, specifically with homeless shelters and pregnancy resources. "There are many service organizations in the area that offer hands-on ministry," Pastor Bill Powis says. "The organizations have made an impact with the residents, who don't realize they are run by Christians."

With several church planters considering calls to the LA area, and praying for many more, Scott says the goals for *Vision LA* are considerable, but achievable. "We're planning and praying for 25 church plants by 2020 and at least three new RUF ministries. ***Right now, there is one PCA church or mission for every 1.6 million people in the LA area. We're praying that God will provide continued funding and the right people to plant many more churches.***" For more information about Vision LA, contact Scott Bridges at 805-692-2078 or sabridges@cpcsb.org.

MNA Disaster Response Prepares for Future Needs


This past fall, Florida was devastated by four hurricanes within the span of six weeks.

MNA Disaster Response Director Ron Haynes and his wife, Judy, headed to the area in August just after the first hurricane hit, to assist the victims and offer support to the PCA churches and families. Joined by volunteers from across the PCA, Ron and Judy were able not only to aid in clearing debris and helping with other practical needs, but also to share Christ's love with those in desperate situations.

Even though volunteers and funds are no longer needed and some time has passed, many of those who experienced loss are still waiting on insurance settlements or contractors in order to continue with rebuilding their homes and lives. ***Pray for them as they continue in this long-term recovery process.***

As Ron and Judy continue working with local PCA churches and their members to get the financial assistance they need, they are also looking toward the future. "This is about our people," Ron says. "Without our people being enthused and wanting to be a part of this mercy ministry, the PCA will not have a disaster response."

Equipping Churches in Gospel Outreach

Known for his incredible servant's heart and passion for prayer, Archie Parrish has dedicated his life to advancing the Gospel. Furthering Church Vitality, MNA will continue to provide services, using the name Revitalization and Evangelism. The ongoing program will have a two-fold emphasis. First, it will place a heightened emphasis on the vitality of the church and on evangelism in the church planting work of MNA. Many churches that are planted often require revitalization four to seven years after starting. MNA will work more intentionally toward the goal of planting biblically healthy churches and keeping them on a strong track by providing intensive, effective training and coaching for church planters. Second, for existing churches that need to be revitalized in their ministries, MNA will offer some direct services and will identify Revitalization and Evangelism resources that can effectively address these needs. *For more information about MNA Revitalization and Evangelism, visit www.pca-mna.org.*
