

Summary of the MNA Disaster Response Ministry efforts in the wake of Hurricane Harvey:

- About 125,000 homes were flooded, some for up to two weeks. The geographical area affected is about 1/2 the size of FL.
- Approximately 50 PCA families were severely affected across S TX including a large number of PCA pastors. Several pastors and communing members of our Korean Southern Presbytery were also heavily affected.
- Two PCA churches flooded, Bay Area PCA and Hosanna PCA; one church, Faith Community PCA, sustained roof damage.
- MNA is channeling financial relief grants to affected PCA churches and members for rebuilding and to reach out in love to their neighbors.
- PCA volunteers from as far away as New England have mucked-out, gutted, and dried-out over 150 homes and now we are rebuilding.
- MNA marshalled relief supplies and equipment from our warehouse in Rome GA including flood buckets, hygiene kits, bedding kits and meals ready-to-eat.
- MNA sent both of our new mobile volunteer bunkhouses and two of our mobile shower trailers where they remain in service.
- Besides muck-out, gutting, blue-tarping, and rebuilding, MNA has activated our Sheds of Hope project. Seven Sheds of Hope have been set up at homes in the Houston, six more are on the way to Houston and eight are headed to Beaumont. We have set up a remote shed pre-build site here in Dallas near Love Field to speed up our efforts.
- Five worksites remain open.

Our plans for Harvey relief efforts going forward include completion of repairs and rebuilding of 20 homes that is currently underway and bringing help to the additional 25 families that are now on a waiting list. Work includes cleanup, sheetrock installation, painting, and other construction projects.

Summary of the MNA Disaster Response Ministry efforts in the wake of Irma:

- 120 of the 160 PCA congregations in Florida were affected at some level by Hurricane Irma.
- Two PCA physical plants suffered extensive damage.
 1. St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Orlando FL (TE - Justin Borger, interim Pastor). The sanctuary's metal façade was blown off which resulted in eight inches of water in their sanctuary. Estimate to rebuild is \$80,000 +.
 2. Faith Presbyterian Church, Sarasota FL (no interim pastor) was flooded due to sewage backup during the storm and lost of the HVAC system. Estimate to repair is over \$50,000.
- El Shaddai of Grace, Naples FL, a majority Haitian congregation of approximately 55 families was particularly hard hit with every family affected, 23 significantly.
- At least six PCA families reported significant damage, ranging from the roof being blown off of their homes to significant flooding. Many reported damages from trees that were blown down on their homes.
- Five worksites opened for the initial cleanup efforts.
- Many churches were participating in a Flood Bucket drive for Houston when Irma struck.
- Hundreds of flood buckets, hygiene kits, and many other supplies were marshalled to FL worksites for distribution from MNA's Disaster Response Warehouse in Rome GA.

- Two volunteer shower trailers were mobilized and remain on site providing clean showers for our teams.
- Approximately 23 PCA families have been assisted by financial relief grants provided by MNA to help with insurance deductibles, temporary housing, food, and other rebuilding needs.
- Over 100 PCA families have received help from volunteer teams.
- More than 100 non-PCA families have been helped by volunteers so far and the number is increasing.
- Two PCA congregations have received large financial grants to assist with restoration of their physical plants.

Our plans for Irma relief efforts going forward include continuing general cleanup in neighborhoods surrounding the worksite locations (Oak River PCA and Marco PCA). These neighborhoods include hard hit communities not currently served by the PCA including the Immokalee, Everglades City, and Goodland areas. Work will continue in Bonita Springs and Naples with day volunteers. Prayerfully consider sending volunteer teams to assist this winter with long-term rebuilding efforts.

Summary of the MNA Disaster Response Ministry efforts in the wake of Maria in Puerto Rico:

Hurricane Maria ravaged the island of Puerto Rico leaving over 18 dead and the entire island without power, and most buildings either destroyed, damaged, or flooded. To date only about 10% of the population has had power restored.

Evangel Presbytery, with Briarwood PCA taking the lead, has established two church plants on the island of Puerto Rico:

- Iglesia La Traves Aa – led by church planter Ronnie Garcia
- Trinity Church of Dorado – led by church planter Bruce Clark

Both churches now have water but are still without power.

Five PCA families lost their homes. These families have now been relocated but all remain without power.

Currently both congregations are working to bring relief to isolated communities that authorities have not yet been able to reach, bringing food and water.

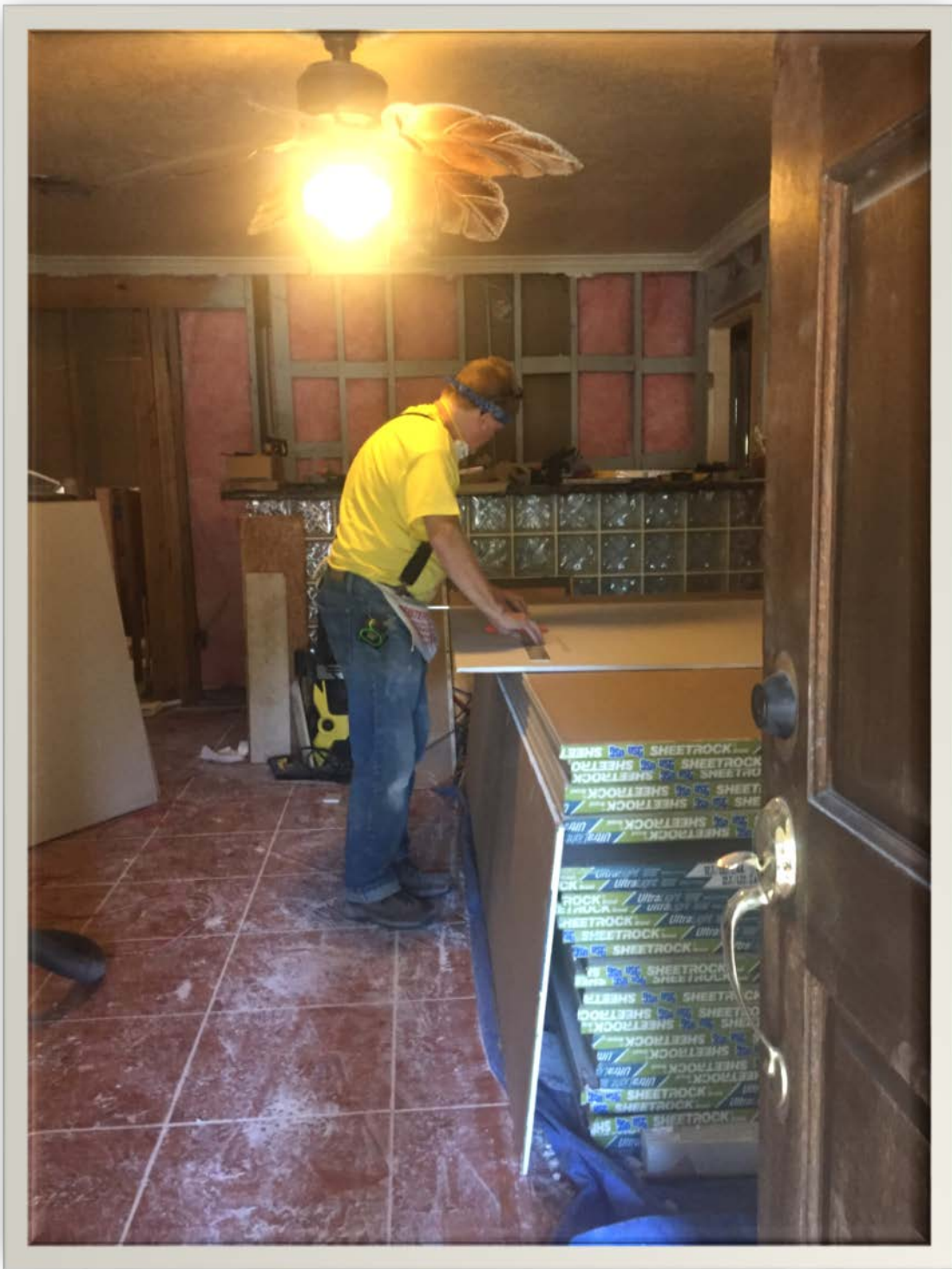

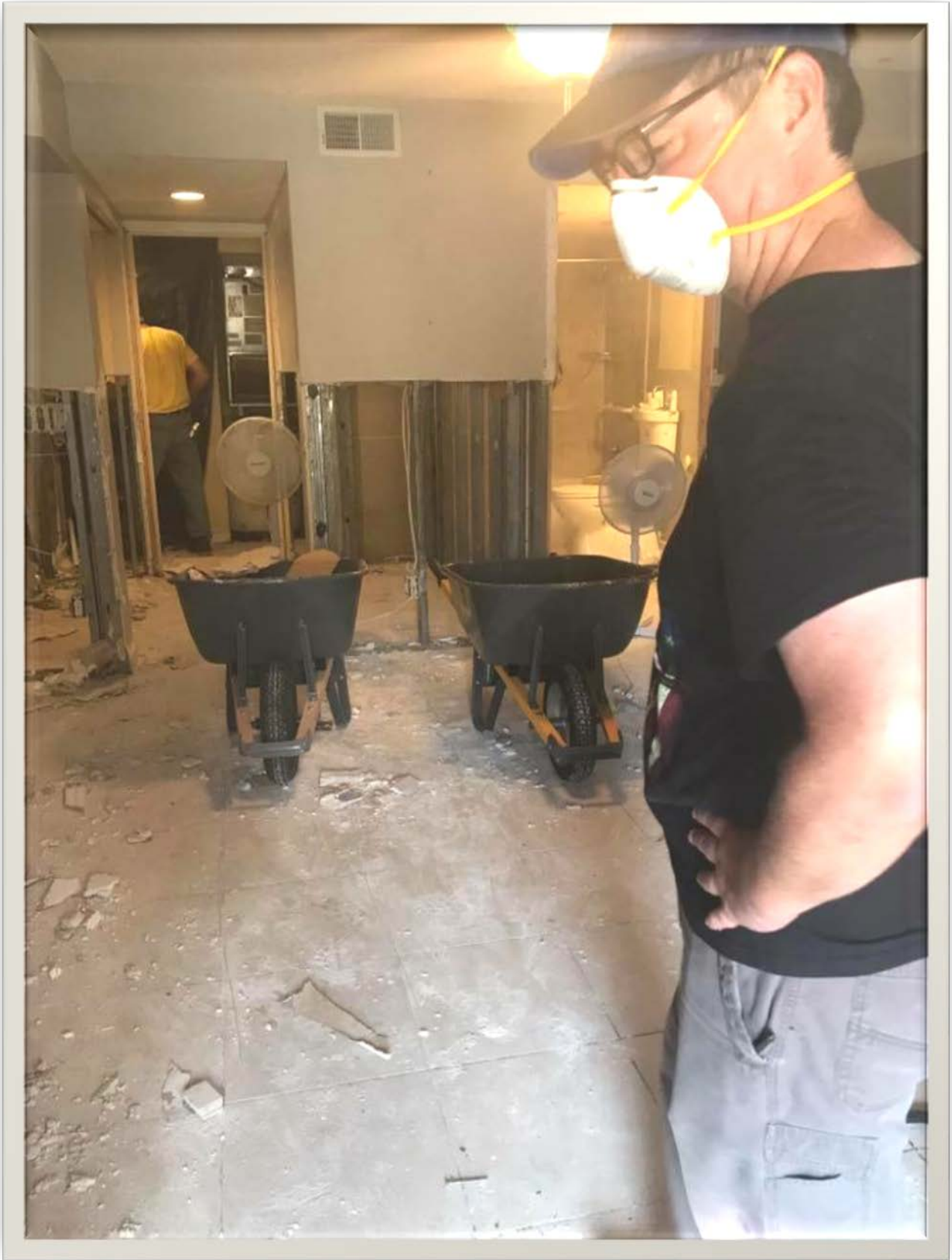

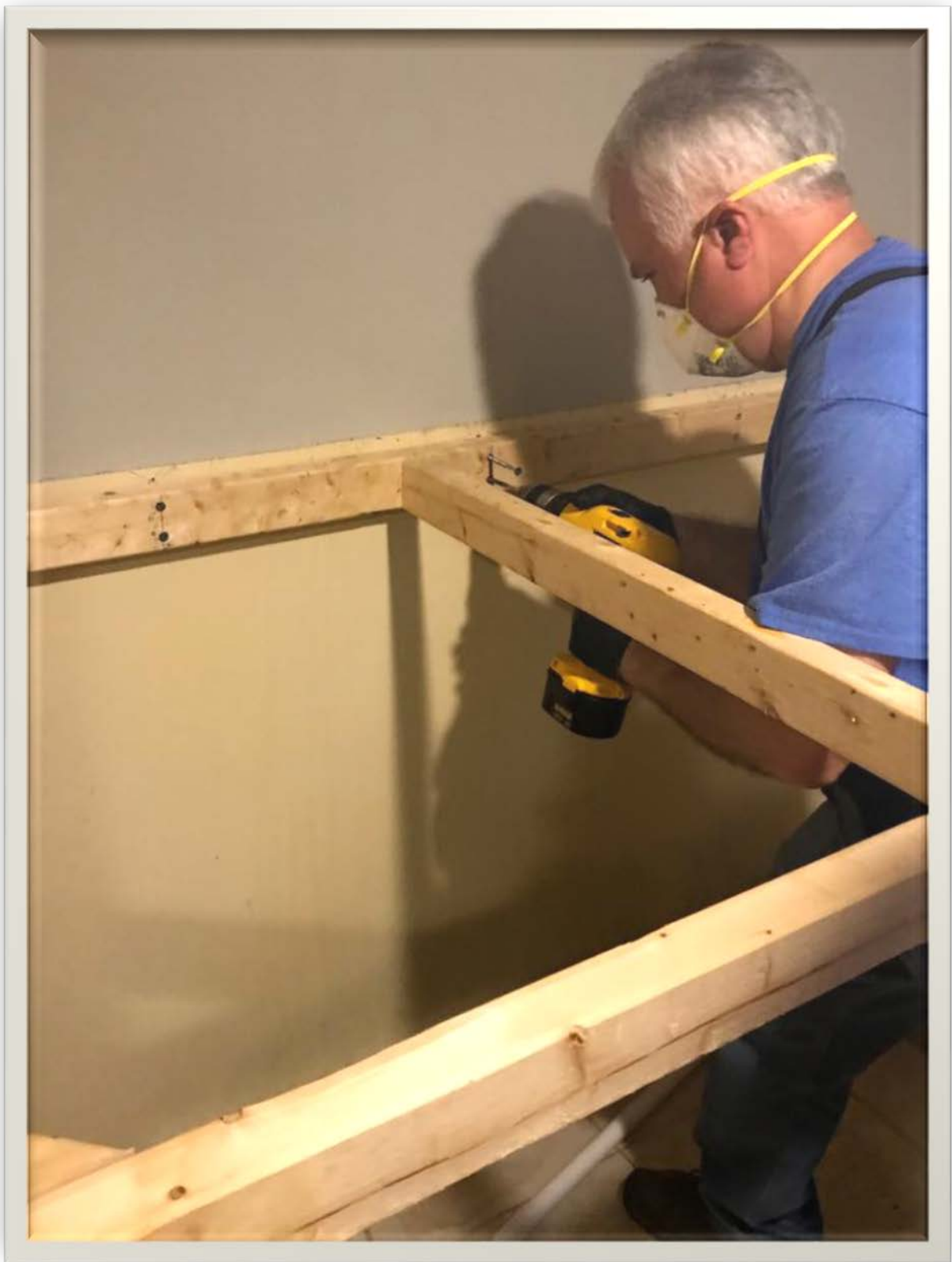

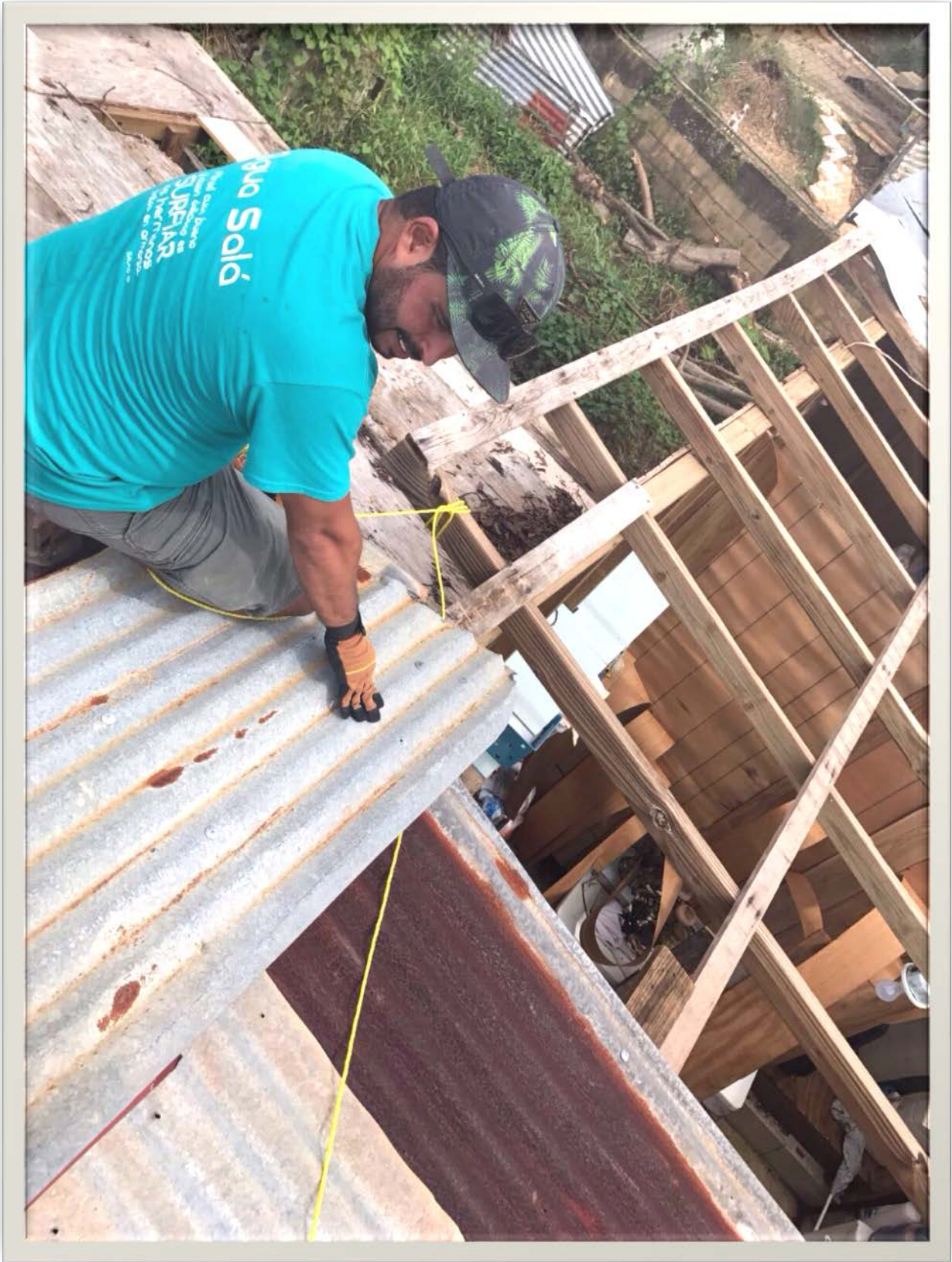
