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



- **A:** That's a good point. I hope you'll have more opportunities to spend time with your new acquaintances.

## Grammar Box B Making Adjectives Negative Many adjectives can be made by adding prefixes

Many adjectives can be made by adding prefixes like *un-, im-*, or *in-*.

un-	<b>im-</b> Usually comes before m or p	in-
unreliable	im <u>m</u> ature	inconsiderate
unenthusiastic	im <u>p</u> atient	insensitive
unwise	im <u>p</u> olite	incorrect

There are other prefixes that can show negatives, too, like *dis-* (disloyal), *il-* (illegal), *in-* (inappropriate) or *ir-* (irregular).

### Culture Box

### Friendship in U.S. Culture

People in the U.S. have many different views on friendship. Some people's childhood friends are **lifelong** friends. Other people have different friends during different stages of their lives. Since it's common for people in the U.S. to move one or many times for education, work, or family, they often look for new friendships when they move. However, since friends can try to keep a **connection** through technology, they might try to keep a few friendships from the past.

Most people would define an **acquaintance** as someone that you've met once or a few times. You know the person's name and a little bit about him/her, and you could have a short, polite conversation. A friend, however, is someone that you know well. You've spent some time together and know more about each other.

Sometimes, an American from the U.S. will say, "We should get together sometime" without making a plan to actually meet. People often say this when they are saying goodbye as a way to show that they are friendly and enjoyed meeting you. This kind of statement, which usually uses "sometime" and doesn't give a specific time, is not a direct invitation to meet. Usual answers are, "That sounds great," or "I'd love to."

If someone says, "We should meet again sometime," but then doesn't contact you and you'd like to get together with him/her, you can contact the person and ask to make a plan to meet.
